He had some large models of the cutting edge of the tools which enabled him to show us clearly, both on the work itself and on the CCTV screen, the angle to put them to the wood and the way to rotate the tool and move it, as the cut progressed.



After that he made the base, in sycamore, and finally the lid. The lid was reversible so that you could have either a long, pointed finial or a short, stubby one. So he not only demonstrated the best way to achieve the cuts, he also discussed the aesthetic appearance of the finished vase. And at the same time he not only told us what to do and how to do it, he encouraged our participation.



We had two newcomers, who participated in the chat and banter as if they were long standing members of the club. We all hoped they would come again next month. As a club we really need to work on getting more new members. In the tea break we were treated to a very nice cake made by Anita, that she brought along with a fine rocking bowl she had made (this month's challenge)! And on the subject of this month's challenge, also during the break, Les gave us a helpful appraisal of every one of the entries, giving expert and skilled advice on the construction, the faults and ideas for improvement of each individual rocking bowl.
